

WHY THE COVER:

Every American of every age should know that June 6, 1944, D-Day, saw the launch of the allied invasion in Normandy that marked the beginning of the end of World War II. Since WW2, military conflicts have been fought with gradually increased reliance on air power and advanced technology and decreasing numbers of boot-on-the-ground. Today, more than 75 years after the end of that war, we read of military strikes carried out by drones piloted remotely by someone thousands of miles away! The phenomenal effort that was D-Day saw over 155,000 troops come ashore at Utah, Omaha, Gold, Juno, and Sword beaches, or drop from the skies. The photo on the cover pays tribute to the bravery of those who charged the beaches from vulnerable landing craft under heavy enemy fire, and the photo at right gives, perhaps, a small taste of the massive human effort in manpower, hardware, and logistical coordination required to pull it off. WHO PUT THE “D” IN D-DAY?

If you're like me and a great many Americans who lived through World War II or were born in the several ensuing decades, you spent much of your life honoring the role D-Day played in liberating western Europe from the Nazis and in the Allied victory overall. You may have studied it in school, read some of the countless books on the war or the generation of Americans who fought it, seen the movies from John Wayne to Tom Hanks, or even, as I did when I was younger, played board-game emulations of the event such as Avalon-Hill's aptly named *D-Day*. For most of my life, it has been part of the fabric of the American experience, and there were few Americans who couldn't tell you that D-Day was on June 6, 1944.



Here's a question — in all that time, have you ever asked what the “D” in D-Day stood for? In today's world, where we overanalyze almost everything, when I recently encountered the question I found myself astonished to realize that I could barely recall whatever I may have learned in youth. After some brain wracking (and we can have the debate over wrack vs. rack another time), I vaguely and uncertainly recalled that it may have stood for “Debarkation” Day—clearly it was time to do a little more digging.

The first thing I encountered was that the question of who put the “D” in D-Day went hand-in-hand with the similar question of who put the “H” in H-Hour. I know many folks who think that the H-Hour expression stems from the use of the atomic bomb on Hiroshima — a fanciful but false belief, probably associated with the “H” in H-bomb, which the bomb dropped on Hiroshima was not.

Using my tried and true, utterly unscientific and unreliable approach to opinion research, I asked a few Brothers and friends the D-Day question. In most cases I got the same tell-tale initial silence in response. Then, after some thought, most said they had never thought about it themselves or vaguely remembered that it didn't stand for anything. The same held true for H-Hour. Only one respondent said it was a “stupid question.”

Well, if it's a stupid question, it is also the most frequently asked question by visitors to The National WWII Museum, according to an official publication of the museum.

It is human nature to create answers for such questions—and many visitors to the museum suggest that they know the answer, with inventive choices such as Designated-day, Decision-day, Doooms-day, and even Death-day being among the frequently offered candidates. The answer, says the museum, is not so simple.

It would seem that even military historians and etymologists can not agree about the meaning of D-Day as illustrated in the following excerpt from the World War II Museum’s handout on the subject.

In Stephen Ambrose’s ***D-Day, June 6, 1944: The Climactic Battle of World War II***, he writes,

Time magazine reported on June 12 [1944] that “as far as the U.S. Army can determine, the first use of D for Day, H for Hour was in Field Order No. 8, of the First Army, A.E.F., issued on Sept. 20, 1918, which read, ‘The First Army will attack at H-Hour on D-Day with the object of forcing the evacuation of the St. Mihiel salient.’” (p. 491)

In other words, the D in D-Day merely stands for Day. This coded designation was used for the day of any important invasion or military operation. For military planners (and later historians), the days before and after a D-Day were indicated using plus and minus signs: D-4 meant four days before a D-Day, while D+7 meant seven days after a D-Day.

In Paul Dickson’s ***War Slang***, he quotes Robert Hendrickson’s ***Encyclopedia of Word and Phrase Origins***,

Many explanations have been given for the meaning of D-Day, June 6, 1944, the day the Allies invaded Normandy from England during World War II. The Army has said that it is “simply an alliteration, as in H-Hour.” Others say the first D in the word also stands for “day,” the term a code designation. The French maintain the D means “disembarkation,” still others say “debarkation,” and the more poetic insist D-Day is short for “day of decision.” When someone wrote to General Eisenhower in 1964 asking for an explanation, his executive assistant Brigadier General Robert Schultz answered: “General Eisenhower asked me to respond to your letter. Be advised that any amphibious operation has a ‘departed date’; therefore the shortened term ‘D-Day’ is used.” (p.146)

Brigadier General Schultz reminds us that the invasion of Normandy on June 6, 1944 was not the only D-Day of World War II. Every amphibious assault—including those in the Pacific, in North Africa, and in Sicily and Italy—had its own D-Day.

So, does the “D” in D-Day stand for nothing, or “Departed Date” or something else—you be your own judge. But one thing is clear. From now on when we refer to “D-Day,” perhaps we should remember that we are referring to **The D-Day**, perhaps the most significant one among many others. 🇺🇸

MY TRIP TO SCOTLAND

William Harvey, a Masonic figure who, you may recall, has featured prominently in a couple of articles in the 18th District Light, specifically, in the December 2020 and February 2017 issues.

I managed to take the screenshot shown below during the proceedings — I didn't catch everyone at their best, but it still provides a useful visual reference to various participants.




The session was hosted by the Right Worshipful Master of Stirling Royal Arch No. 76, Bro. David W. Brown (leftmost picture, top row). I was honored to be able to convey the greetings of Most Worshipful Grand Master, Robert V. Monacelli, to Brother Brown and our brethren in Bonnie Scotland, and Bro. Brown graciously returned the gesture. I have conveyed his reciprocal greetings to our Grand Master via his Secretary.

The reason I was so privileged was thanks to the kind invitation of Bro. Stewart Donaldson (second from the left, top row), a fellow Masonic publisher who puts out SRA No.76

magazine, a wonderful monthly Masonic publication, which can be found online at <https://issuu.com/sra76/docs>. If you are looking for a wealth of Masonic reading and wisdom, you must give SRA No.76 a look.

Bro. Iain D. McIntosh (3rd from the left, top row), the speaker of the day, is a Past Master of Lodge Broughty Castle No. 486, Past Substitute Provincial Grand Master of Forfarshire, Past Provincial Grand Treasurer, Past Provincial Grand Secretary, and Master of Lodge



Discovery No. 1789. He is also an Affiliate Member of the Quatuor Coronati Lodge No. 2076 (English Constitution).

Bro. McIntosh’s presentation offered an in-depth look at one of Scottish Masonry’s significant figures, from his birth, in Stirling, in 1874; through his early life and apprenticeships; through a distinguished career as a writer and publisher; and especially through a

most impressive Masonic career; to his death from a heart attack in 1936. So thoroughly comprehensive was Bro. McIntosh’s lecture that one could not have looked for more detail on the life of Bro. Harvey from a dedicated biography. Bro. Harvey is a celebrated alumnus of Stirling Royal Arch No. 76 and was also a founding member of Lodge Progress No. 967, Dundee. A summary of Brother Harvey’s legacy is presented in the sidebar, borrowed from one of Bro. McIntosh’s closing slides.

The Master, Bro. Brown, expressed appreciation for the “international audience” and has assured me that he will provide link information to similar opportunities in the future—which I hope to be able to share with our 18th District brethren.

The proliferation of video conferencing technology that has accompanied the pandemic has opened doors that I had not previously imagined, and I hope that on my next trip across the Atlantic, some of you will be able to join me.

Rising Sun is honored and proud to be able to name Sr. Marianne as the lodge’s outstanding Educator-of-the-Year for 2020 & 2021.

HONORING ONE OF OUR OWN


Brothers serve Freemasonry in many different ways. Some sit peacefully on the sidelines for many years. Others may sit in various officer chairs year in and year out, or rise through the chairs to occupy the East. Many move on into the appendant bodies, where there are innumerable more offices and fancy titles to add to their Masonic resumes. In every Masonic body there are committees and boards and more committees galore for those who pursue Masonic variety.
