## THE TRAVELING GAVEL



Possession of the Traveling Gavel is the 18<sup>th</sup> District’s symbol of honor for Lodges that fulfill the spirit of Masonic Travel. The Gavel, along with its accompanying logbook, remains with the Lodge last able to capture it until claimed by another Lodge under these rules.

A Worshipful Master and any other four (or more) Master Masons from his Lodge may claim the Gavel by visiting the current Gavel-holders for any regular or emergent communication. The claimants must all be present from the Opening through the Closing of the Lodge. In the case of competing claims, the Gavel shall go to the visiting Lodge with the largest contingent. If still tied on that basis, the Master of the host Lodge shall decide the tie by coin flip.

Once claimed the new Gavel holders should record their claim in the logbook, and report it to the Deputy and the 18th District Light at the first opportunity. The Gavel should be prominently displayed in the East during all communications until claimed by another Lodge.


# Honoring One of Our Own

# READ A BOOK! READ A BOOK!


An 18th District Light Editorial: WB David A. Frankel, Editor

The latest studies indicate that 27% of American adults — more than one in four — have not read a book, nor any part of a book, in any format, in the last year! Are you one of them? When someone walks into your home, will they see a bookshelf in view (with books on it, not knick-knacks)?

Since the dawn of recorded history, the collective wisdom of the human race has been chiseled, written, or printed in some tangible form of expression. The phrase is even immortalized in U.S. Copyright law: Copyright subsists in original works of authorship *fixed in a tangible medium of expression*. Be it stone tablet, papyrus scroll, or the printed page, the knowledge, wisdom, creativity, and opinions of mankind have been “written down” for roughly five thousand years.

It is only in the last thirty or forty years that we have seen the conversion of the printed word into digital impulses that flash across the ever shrinking screens of computers, tablets, cell phones, and now, even wristwatches. And although much of the collective wisdom of mankind may be available through the modern miracle of electronics, cyberspace, and “the cloud,” we have, at the same time, engendered a culture that prizes brevity and rapidity over depth and reflection. I have had brothers complain to me that e-mails of only a few sentences or a couple of paragraphs are “too long” to be read in their entirety, and that there was only time to scan them. Aside from the fact that 19 times out of 20, scanning something means that you will misunderstand, misinterpret, or simply miss the critical point of the communication, what else does that say about our culture — and more importantly — about our character as Freemasons?

Modern Freemasonry was born out of “*The Enlightenment*.” Its development was driven by men with scientific curiosity and a desire to understand not only the Supreme Architect of the Universe, but also the details — the “symmetry and order” — of his grand design.

*If you can keep your head when all about you  
Are losing theirs and blaming it on you,  
If you can trust yourself when all men doubt you,  
But make allowance for their doubting too;  
If you can wait and not be tired by waiting,  
Or being lied about, don't deal in lies,  
Or being hated, don't give way to hating,  
And yet don't look too good, nor talk too wise:*

*If you can dream—and not make dreams your master;  
If you can think—and not make thoughts your aim;  
If you can meet with Triumph and Disaster  
And treat those two impostors just the same;  
If you can bear to hear the truth you've spoken  
Twisted by knaves to make a trap for fools,  
Or watch the things you gave your life to, broken,  
And stoop and build 'em up with worn-out tools:*

*If you can make one heap of all your winnings  
And risk it on one turn of pitch-and-toss,  
And lose, and start again at your beginnings  
And never breathe a word about your loss;  
If you can force your heart and nerve and sinew  
To serve your turn long after they are gone,  
And so hold on when there is nothing in you  
Except the Will which says to them: "Hold on!"*

*If* was first published in 1910 in *Rewards and Fairies*, a collection of Kipling's poetry and short-stories.


In the posthumously published autobiography *Something of Myself* (1937), Kipling said that his poetic inspiration for the poem was the military actions of Leander Starr Jameson, leader of the failed Jameson Raid against the Transvaal Republic in the First Boer War.

In that same autobiography Kipling wrote: "In 1885, I was made a Freemason by dispensation (being under age) in The Lodge of Hope and Perserverance 782E.C. because the Lodge hoped for a good Secretary."

**Editor:** This is my favorite poem of all time; that it is of Masonic authorship is a special bonus. It was first presented in the District Light in February 2016, but I present it here again for our newest members who may not be familiar with Bro. Kipling, the fact that he was a Freemason, or with his poem, *If*.

# Masonic Profile: Johann Christian Bach

For those who immediately wondered at the title — no — we didn't get the middle name wrong. **Johann Christian Bach** was the eighteenth child of Johann *Sebastian* Bach and the youngest of eleven sons. Johann Sebastian's prolificacy was evidently not limited to his composing! Born September 5, 1735, to a 50 year old Johann Sebastian and Anna Magdalena Bach, in Leipzig, Germany, Johann Christian followed in his father's musical footsteps as a classical composer. His father instructed Johann Christian in music until his own death in 1750, despite distinct differences in their musical styles. Johann Christian would eventually become a Freemason in the Lodge of the Nine Muses No. 235, in London.



After his father's death, Johann Christian lived and worked with his second-oldest half brother, Carl Philipp Emanuel Bach, who was twenty-one years older and considered to be the most musically gifted of Bach's sons. Nevertheless, Johann Christian's career showed much promise as both a composer and a performer. He composed cantatas, chamber music, keyboard and orchestral works, operas and symphonies.

From 1754 to 1762, J. C. Bach lived in Italy where he studied with Padre Martini in Bologna. He became organist at the Milan cathedral in 1760. During his time in Italy he devoted much of his time to the composition of church music.

In 1762, Bach traveled to London to premier three operas at the King's Theatre. Success established his reputation in England and he became music master to Queen Charlotte. In 1766, Bach met and married soprano Cecilia Grassi. He performed symphonies and concertos at the Hanover Square Rooms, London's most significant concert venue in the heart of fashionable Mayfair. The area provided a well-to-do audience for his performances. One of London's primary literary circles, included such notables as Jane Timburey, Robert Gunnell Esq., Lord Beauchamp and Her Grace the Duchess of Buccleuch. They were all acquainted with Bach and were regular attendees at his events.

By the late 1770s, both Bach's popularity and finances were in decline, the latter situation due in no small part to his steward embezzling substantial sums of money. At the time of his death on New Year's Day 1782, he had become so indebted that Queen Charlotte stepped in to cover the expenses of his estate and provide a life pension for Bach's widow. He was buried in the graveyard of St. Pancras Old Church, London.

In 1764, Bach met with Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart, who was aged eight at the time and had been brought to London by his father. Bach then spent five months teaching Mozart in composition. Bach is widely regarded as having a strong influence on the young Mozart, described by some scholars as Mozart's only true teacher. Mozart arranged three sonatas from Bach's Op. 5 into keyboard concertos and, in later life, often acknowledged the artistic debt he felt he owed to Johann Christian Bach.






